The Bryan Cameron Impact Scholarship

Deadline: September 13, 2019

Eligibility: High school **Senior** who plans to continue his/her education at a four-year college or university. Student must be a U.S. citizen, have a minimum 3.7 (on a 4.0 scale) GPA, excel in a broad variety of extra-curricular activities, be active in community service, and have a belief in the student's capacity to effect change in the world. The student must be exceptional in all their achievements. The award is for four-year, full-tuition scholarships with a value of between \$20,000 and \$50,000 per year. The Gates Scholarship

Deadline: September 15, 2019

Eligibility: High school **Seniors who are African-American, Hispanic American, American Indian/Alaska Native, or Asian & Pacific Islander American** who plan to enroll full-time in a four-year college or university. **Must be from low-income family and have a GPA of at least 3.3 on a 4.0 scale.** Applicant should also be involved in community service or extracurricular activities. Golden Door Scholarship

Deadline: September 16, 2019

Eligibility: DACA recipient, high GPA, taking advanced or challenging high school classes, driven to excel and help others succeed, has held leadership positions or is involved in the community, actively applying for a variety of scholarships

S.T.E.A.M. Expo Scholarship

Deadline: September 23, 2019

Eligibility: High school **Juniors and Seniors** interested in a **career in a STEAM field** (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts/Agriculture, and Math) are invited to submit an essay on the topic “Why Should Students think S.T.E.A.M. in the New Millennium?” The amount of the scholarship is unspecified. You'll submit your essay via email, but, if you are notified that you are a winner, you must attend the STEAM Expo on Friday, October 4, 2019, 9 a.m.-3 p.m., at the Los Angeles Trade Tech College, 400 W Washington Blvd, Los Angeles, CA 90015. QuestBridge National College Match Program

Deadline: September 26, 2019

Eligibility: High school **Seniors** who plan to attend college in Fall 2020. The QuestBridge National College Match is designed for high school seniors who have shown outstanding academic ability despite facing economic challenges. Selection is based on how well the applicant fits the following questions:

"Does this student have the motivation and academic ability to thrive at one of our partner colleges?"

"Has this student overcome socio-economic obstacles to achieve academic excellence?"

The National College Match program helps highly motivated, low-income students gain admission and full four-year scholarships (covering tuition, room and board) to specific highly-selective partner colleges. Application information and guidelines are available at: www.questbridge.org.

AES Engineers Scholarship

Deadline: October 6, 2019

Eligibility: High school **Senior** who may, or may not, be taking Engineering classes. Students will submit an essay of from 500 to 1000 words in answer to a question: "*When you look back on your life in 30 years, what would it take for you to consider your life successful? What relationships or accomplishments will be important on this journey?*" Award will be based on character as evidenced by your answer to the essay, and not based on GPA. Amount of award is \$500. Latino Expo Scholarship

Deadline: October 7, 2019

Eligibility: High school **Juniors and Seniors** of **Hispanic** heritage are eligible to submit an essay on the topic "Why is a college education important to me?" The amount of the scholarship is unspecified. You'll submit your essay via email, but, if you are notified that you are a winner, you must attend the **Latino College Expo** on Saturday, October 19, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Sheraton Fairplex Conference Center, Pomona. Music Center Spotlight Award—Performing Arts

Deadline: October 14, 2019

Scholarships and training in the arts for high school students. Eligibility: Students of exceptional talent level enrolled in high school (**9th–12th grades**). Apply for evaluation in the following Performing Arts Categories: Non-Classical Voice, Classical Voice, Non-Classical Dance, Ballet, Jazz Instrumental, Classical Instrumental, and Acting. For more information, to apply, and submit audition video online, go to www.musiccenter.org/spotlight. No fees to participate. Awards range from \$100-\$5,000.

Colgate-Palmolive—Haz La U (Make the U)—Hispanic Heritage Youth Awards

Deadline: October 15, 2019

Eligibility: High School **Senior of Hispanic/Latino descent (at least one parent)** who plans to attend college in the Fall 2020. Must have a minimum 3.0 GPA. Awards range from \$2,000-\$15,000 for winners. Short essay, letter of recommendation, and GPA verification must be included with the application. Go to www.colgate.com/hazlau for more information.

Horatio Alger Scholarship

Deadline: October 25, 2019

For high school **Seniors** graduating in 2020 and planning to enter college in Fall 2020 to pursue a bachelor's degree (students may start at a 2-year institution and then transfer to a 4-year college). Applicants must have a minimum 2.0 GPA, be a U.S. citizen, be involved in extra-curricular and community service activities, have household earnings of \$55,000 or less, and display perseverance in overcoming adversity. Several scholarships are awarded in varying amounts from \$6,000 to \$25,000. Apply online at <https://scholars.horatioalger.org>.

Coca Cola Scholars Foundation Scholarship

Deadline: October 31, 2019

The award is for high school **Seniors** graduating in Spring 2020 and planning to pursue a degree at an accredited U.S. postsecondary institution. This is an achievement-based scholarship. Applicant must be a U.S. citizen, U.S. permanent resident or temporary resident (in a legalization program). Student must have a minimum 3.0 GPA at the end of junior year of high school and have highly developed interests in their community as well as leadership in school and academic achievement. Voice of Democracy Scholarship**Deadline: October 31, 2019**

Eligibility: This scholarship is open to students in grades 9-12. Students must be enrolled in a public, private or parochial high school or home study program in the United States. US citizenship is not required, students must be lawful U.S. permanent residents. To enter, you must record your original 3-5 minute essay on an audio CD or a flash drive. One student per CD or flash drive. Students should email the Voice of Democracy National Office at youthscholarships@vfw.org for special instructions. Students may submit their entry directly to the post.

Ron Brown Scholar Program**Deadline: November 1, 2019**

(If you apply by this deadline, your application will be given early consideration.) This program seeks to identify **African-American high school Seniors** who will make significant contributions to society. Applicants must excel academically, exhibit exceptional leadership potential, participate in community service activities, demonstrate financial need, and plan to attend a four-year college or university. The applicant must be a U.S. citizen or hold a permanent resident visa card. Award is \$10,000 annually for four years, for a total of \$40,000. The Prudential Spirit of Community Awards**Deadline: November 5, 2019**

This award recognizes **middle school and high school** students who are U. S. residents and have demonstrated exemplary **community service** having given a minimum 50 hours or 100 hours of community service (depending on your age). State honorees will receive \$1,000. The national honorees will be awarded an additional \$5,000. There are several steps to the application so apply early. Apply online at www.spirit.prudential.com

Jack Kent Cook Foundation—College Scholarship Program**Deadline: November 13, 2019**

Eligibility: High school **Seniors** who are planning to attend a 4-year college or university. Students must show exceptional academic ability and achievement, financial need, persistence, a desire to help others, and leadership. A minimum GPA of 3.5, SAT combined score of 1200 or above or ACT of 26 or above, and family income less than \$95,000. The award is for up to \$40,000 per year for college expenses. Alert1 Student for Seniors Scholarship**Deadline: January 10, 2020**

Eligibility: High School **Seniors** who have worked with senior citizens and are interested in improving senior care. Students must be planning to attend an accredited college or university after high school and be a U.S. citizen. Applicants will be asked to answer three short essay questions about their work with seniors. The award is for \$250. Information and the application is online at www.alert-1.com/scholarship

Requirements for all HSF scholarships are: must be of Hispanic heritage; be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident; minimum 3.0 GPA and must have applied for federal financial aid (FAFSA). 3. While scholarship opportunities for undocumented students seem scarce, there are opportunities nonetheless. Not all scholarships will explicitly call for "undocumented" students - they may require students to have a specific status such as DACA, AB 540, etc. Some scholarships may not even ask about immigration status or citizenship, so you may qualify for those scholarships if you are currently undocumented. Make sure to check your state's immigration laws and policies when applying for scholarships and other forms of financial aid.
